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ABSTRACT

The project was conducted at Sabang Naic, Cavite from December 13, 2018 to March 20, 2019. This project enabled the student – entrepreneur to develop and acquire skills and knowledge in backyard hog fattening, acquire managerial skills in hog raising and gain profit from the project. The project started with weanlings weighing 11.5 kg. They were fed 50 kg starter pellet, 100 kg grower pellet and 50 kg finisher pellet. Feeding was done twice a day for the first week and thrice a day for the rest of the production. The cleaning of pen, bathing of stocks and collection of manure was done twice a day.

After 98 days of rearing the fattened four hogs, the hogs gained an average weight of 90.5 kg with an average feed consumption of 200 kg and average feed conversion efficiency of 2.53.

The project invested \raiseta 39,410.80 for the cost of stocks, feeds and miscellaneous. The project gained a net income of \raiseta 4,189.20 and the return of investment was 10.62%.

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INTRODUCTION

Backyard hog fattening can be a profitable venture that requires a higher capital than most agricultural ventures. Hog fattening normally require 3-4 months and can provide decent profit. It is one of the livestock enterprises that can add to the meager income of every marginal farmer.

The per capita pork consumption is annually increasing. Thus, the meat produced from backyard hog raising can be sold in local market, processed into various preparations, or sold in liveweight, thus the supply of pork and augmenting the demand of pork of Filipinos.
